

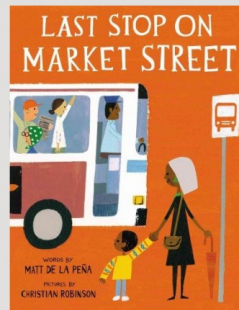

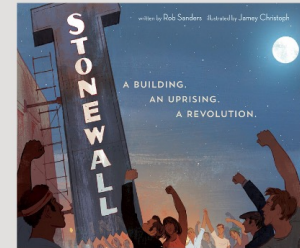

## Kids BOOK CLUB for adults...

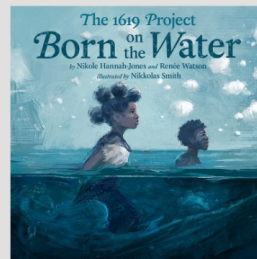

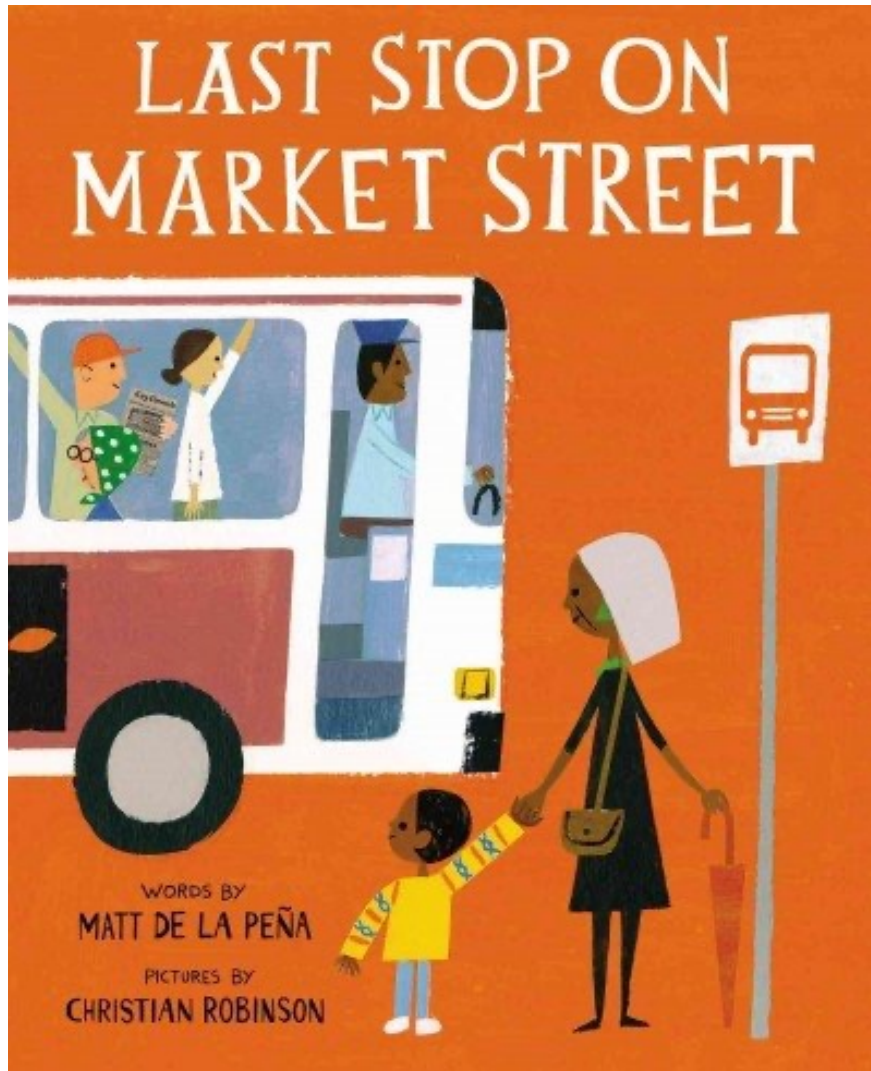

## Topics for Discussion

We often can't imagine other's lived experiences – what is life like for individuals who do not use cars? Can we relate this back to Boston, a big city with buses, trains, and cars everywhere.

Nana dismisses the idea of needing a car, why might that be significant?

We saw individuals who had vision impairment, using wheelchairs – Why does that matter?

The people on the bus demonstrated community, Nana touches the hand of the vision impaired individual after they complement her – the musician plays music, and everyone applauds afterwards. What might community mean in this context? What does it say when community takes place among a diverse (class, ability, race) group of people?

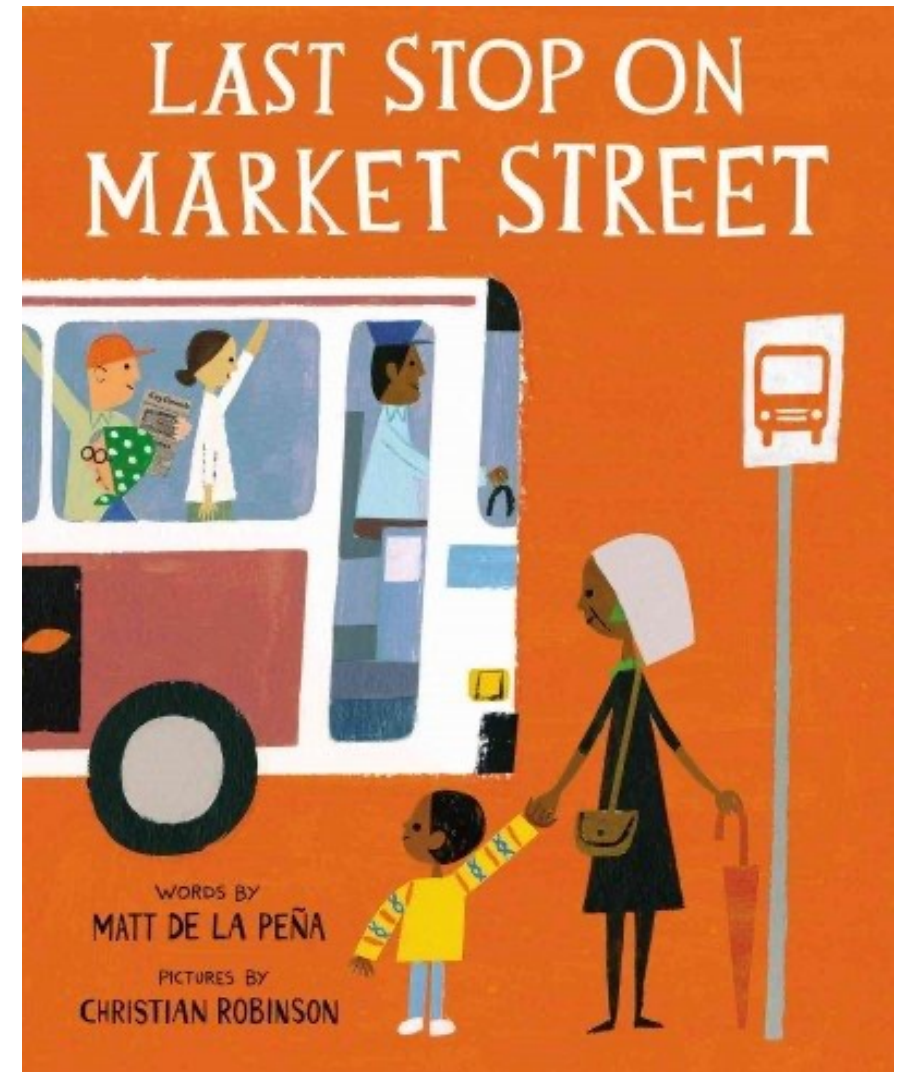
Questions we might ask our little learners:

Which identities did you hear/see in the book? –

with tattoos!!!

What type of individuals did you hear about or  
see in the book? People with seeing eye dogs,  
young people listening to headphones, doggies,  
and musicians!

What does it mean to be a “better witness for
